The FIRST LESSON: Proverbs 11 vv. 1–12

False scales are an abomination to the Lord, but accurate weights win his favour. When pride comes in, in comes contempt, but wisdom goes hand in hand with modesty. Integrity is a guide for the upright; the perfidious are ruined by their own duplicity. Wealth avails naught in the day of wrath, but uprightness is a safeguard against death. By uprightness the blameless keep their course, but the wicked are brought down by their own wickedness. Uprightness saves the righteous, but the perfidious are trapped by their own lies. When someone wicked dies, all his hopes perish. and any expectation of affluence ends. The righteous are rescued from disaster, and the wicked plunge into it. By their words the godless try to ruin others, but when the righteous plead for them they are saved. A city rejoices in the prosperity of the righteous, and when the wicked perish there is jubilation. By the blessing of the upright a city is raised to greatness, but the words of the wicked tear it down. One who belittles others is lacking in sense; someone of understanding holds his peace.

St Paul's Service Herbert Howells (1892–1983) After giving their testimony and speaking the word of the Lord, they took the road back to Jerusalem, bringing the good news to many Samaritan villages on the way.

Then the angel of the Lord said to Philip, 'Start out and go south to the road that leads down from Jerusalem to Gaza.' (This is the desert road.) He set out and was on his way when he caught sight of an Ethiopian. This man was a eunuch, a high official of the Kandake, or queen, of Ethiopia, in charge of all her treasure; he had been to Jerusalem on a pilgrimage and was now returning home, sitting in his carriage and reading aloud from the prophet Isaiah. The Spirit said to Philip, 'Go and meet the carriage.' When Philip ran up he heard him reading from the prophet Isaiah and asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' He said, 'How can I without someone to guide me?' and invited Philip to get in and sit beside him.

The passage he was reading was this: 'He was led like a sheep to the slaughter; like a lamb that is dumb before the shearer, he does not open his mouth. He has been humiliated and has no redress. Who will be able to speak of his posterity? For he is cut off from the world of the living.'

'Please tell me', said the eunuch to Philip, 'who itis that the prophet is speaking about here: himself or someone else?' Then Philip began and, starting from this passage, he told him the good news of Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water. 'Look,' said the eunuch, 'here is water: what is to prevent my being baptized?' and he ordered the carriage to stop. Then they both went down into the water, Philip and the eunuch, and he baptized him. When they came up from the water the Spirit snatched Philip away; the eunuch .did not see him again, but went on his way rejoicing. Philip appeared at Azotus, and toured the country, preaching in all the towns till he reached Caesarea. The Choir sings the NUNC DIMITTIS:
